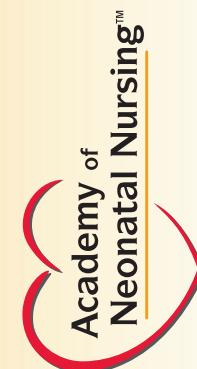
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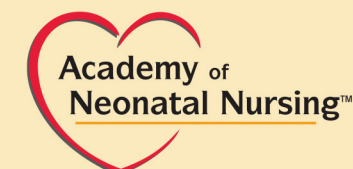

 patients, primarily neonates, with a high
 likelihood of mortality. As advanced respiratory
 modalities were developed, the use of ECMO
 declined in the neonatal population. However,
 the use of extracorporeal life support expanded
 to other areas and populations. Technological
 advances have changed bedside management
 protocols and also treatment team composition.
 In addition to its application for respiratory and/or
 cardiac failure, ECMO is now applied for novel
 uses, and also as a bridge to other therapies.

 sleep, pain, inflammatory processes, or in the
